

Harvard's Glenn Fine in Land of Basketball Giants

Today basketball has become a sport for "giants," a bastion unassisted by lipulations. Short people are a doomed race in this game. Though basketball is considered a big man's game, there are still performers who are short in stature, yet stand tall in talent. Harvard's Glenn Fine measures only 5'10 and scales 155 pounds, but the Melrose Park resident rarely caught short-handed or given the short shrift on a collegiate basketball court.

FINE EARNED "Player of the Week" honors from the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference this season for his stellar performance in the Crimson's stunning 93-87 upset victory over Pennsylvania, the Ivy League champions. He dropped six free throws in as many attempts in the final moments to insure Harvard's first win over Penn in 10 years.

A Fine basket with 2:27 left gave Harvard its final tie at 83 apiece. One-and-one conversions by Harvard with 2:03 and 1:18 remaining gave them an 87-83 lead. Penn then pressed and it was Fine who held them off. He successfully made both ends of the one-and-one situations with 40. 28 and 11 seconds to play to halt any Quaker hopes of rallying.

SUCH A PERFORMANCE assured him All-Ivy League second team honors. He led the Ivy League in assists with seven

per outing and 174 playmaking tallies to his credit.

When Harvard visited the Motor City Classic earlier in their 11-15 season, Fine left Detroit with All-Tournament honors. He earned the "Mr. Hustle Award" for his 15 assists against Detroit. On the season, Fine hit double figures in 12 contests and led the Crimson in steals (53) as well.

"SURE IT'S TOUGHER to play basketball if you're small," admitted Fine, "but

it's not impossible. You just have to work harder. If I use my size as an excuse, then I'm copping out. It's how big you are inside that counts. I'm quicker than the big guards, and I use this to compensate for my size. In a full court game it's tougher for my opponents to stay with me."

At Cheltenham High School, the 1974 graduate was always associated with winning teams in basketball and football. His most outstanding basketball performance was enacted in a high school all-star tilt. "We had only seven players. It was a rough game and was called tight," recalled Fine.

"WE WERE DOWN to five players and ahead by eight points. When one fouled out, we were down to four players and led by one in the closing minutes. Eventually two more teammates were eliminated as the game went into overtime. I tried to stall. Occasionally I'd hit my lone teammate on a fast break, but the opposition always scored when going down court."

this was a good chance to get a year off from school. I did some janitorial work at Harvard to earn spending money. Then I hitch-hiked to the West and Canada. I served as an intern for a public interest law firm in Berkeley. Then I worked as a waiter in a resort in West Palm Beach, Florida.

"I ALSO LIVED in New Hampshire and spent the summer in Washington, D.C., doing construction work before purchasing a motorcycle and heading back to New England. It was a different kind of education, going to a new city, confronting new people and experiences. I really profited from this year of travel.

"It was an adjustment to come back to Harvard. I felt older than my contemporaries, but I was glad to be back," said Fine, an economics major who will captain the Harvard squad this coming season.

GLENN FINE, the Cheltenham High graduate, playing for Harvard was a key playmaker last season, coming up with 174 assists as a junior guard.

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Dopped six free throws in as many attempts with 40, 28 and 11 seconds of play to guide the Crimson to a 38-37 upset win over the Quakers last for the first time on the Cambridge campus since 1965, failing to Harvard anywhere in the past 10 years. Returning to the Ivy school after a year's leave of absence, Fine fell short by four of his school standard of 178 assists set his sophomore campaign.

Harvard blots out Penn on Fine shooting

Harvard pulled the Ivy League basketball upset of the year last night when it came from behind in the closing minutes to defeat Penn, 93-87, at Harvard.

Penn entered the game with 18 straight wins over Harvard and was 9-0 in Ivy League play. The Crimson tied it with 2-22 remaining on Glenn Fine's jumper and won it from the foul line when Fine hit on six of six free throws in the last 40 seconds. Brian Banks was high man for Harvard with 24 points. Harvard is 8-12 overall and 5-4 in the league.

UMass destroyed George Washington, 77-57, as Mike Pyatt led the attack with 19 points. Pyatt also became the Minutemen's all-time career scoring leader as he passed Julius Erving's record. UMass is now 14-7 and GW, 15-8.

N.E. COLLEGE BASKETBALL

Suffolk University stunned New England's Division 3 leader Brandeis, 73-67, at Waltham. Suffolk stars included Pat Ryan with 20 points, Donovan Little with 20 points and 13 rebounds and Bob Mello with 16 assists.

Northeastern upped its record to 13-9 by toppling American International, 76-68, at NJU. Dave Caligaris led the Huskies with 21 points and Northeastern outrebounded AIC, 44-23, with Chip Rucker grabbing 10.

Seton Hall (15-9) jolted Holy Cross (18-5), 76-74, scoring its last 10 points from the free throw line. Seton Hall had a tremendous edge on fouls hitting on 20 of 25 while HC had only six tries and converted all six. SH's Greg Tynes led all scorers with 24 points.

Nationally-ranked Providence Col-

lege, using reserves most of the way, registered its 21st victory in 25 starts when it beat Campbell College from Buile's Creek, N.C., 63-54, at the Providence Civic Center.

PC coach Dave Gavitt used 13 players and high man was freshman Rody Williams with 12 points. Campbell College, playing in NCAA Division I competition for the first time, is 9-13. The five PC starters played 25 minutes or less.

Rhode Island downed Kings College (Wilkes-Barre, Pa., 82-71, to give coach Jack Kraft his 300th career win in 17 seasons.

The Rams shot 47 percent from the floor and were led by their All-American candidate Sly Williams who had 26

points and 16 rebounds. Juggy Withers had 16 for the visitors who are now 14-8.

Greg Pasulio scored 40 of Brandeis'

points as the Polar Bears upped

Norwich, 66-65.

Jim Arromaitos purposed in 16 points as he paced UConn to a 59-48 victory over Vermont. UConn's tough man-to-man defense kept UVM scoreless the first five minutes and 23 seconds.

Dan Hartigan sank four free throws in the final minute to give New Hampshire an 85-81 edge over Colgate. Tufts won its sixth straight by bombing Curry, 118-88, after shooting a torrid 67 percent from the floor.

Princeton shot 68 percent from the field while beating Dartmouth, 62-47.

Columbia won its fifth straight

tournament title by defeating Cornell, 84-66.

Things are looking good around the IAB these days. The new enthusiasm comes from Harvard's recent 93-87 upset of Pennsylvania. It marked the first time in 20 games that Harvard had beaten Penn and was Penn's first Ivy loss of the season after nine straight victories. Junior guard Glenn Fine hit six free throws in the final 40 seconds to provide the margin of victory. The club made it two straight with a 96-91 win over Brandeis and with three of the final five games at home, a .500 season is a real possibility for first-year coach Frank McLaughlin.
